I have 16 years teaching and research experience in Mathematics, *a subject that is considered as ghost for many of you*. The more days, months, years passing in my life, I feel that I am still a student who is learning from her own faults/achievements, from her students, and from every single person I meet.

As an undergraduate student, I focused (only) on getting my Bachelor degree with the best understanding of the subject accompanied with the highest grades. Reflecting back on that part of my life, I realized that I missed many important things that I could do without affecting my purpose. The real thing that I missed was enjoying my university life. This was one of the things I wished I knew at that time: *"University life goes beyond earning a certificate. It is the skills we gain from participating in activities and interacting with colleagues and instructors."*

For our students, I would like to share things I realized their importance for happiness, success, and for being a long-life learner.

The learning process never ends with earned certificates. No matter what and how many they are. Enjoy every step of the journey.

Be clever when dealing with feedback. Not everyone is qualified to provide feedback. Analyze the feedback and construct your improvement accordingly.

Be patient when deciding to master a new skill. The "willing to" is the base, small steps will complete the job. Remember "The beauty of Burj Khalifa is not the result of a single day's work".

Take advantage of every single activity/competition that is done inside (or outside) the university. It is not necessary to get a reward. The real reward that matters with time, is your involvement.

Train yourself on positivity. It is contagious.

There are no bad experiences. They are our best lessons that improve our growth. "My best lessons were from the worse people I met. Learning just not to be like them is a skill."

Most importantly, be kind. Kindness starts with a smile and remember that "There are no taxes on smile. So, think financially and cheer up!"

There is no A-student or an F-student. We are not evaluated by grades. Remember that "A grade doesn't evaluate us as a person. It evaluates a very specific task that we did. It rates our achievement for the learning outcome of this specific task." Sharing my experience as a student

My student experience was very different from what we enjoy at ADU. The pinnacle of educational technology was an overhead transparency projector, and chalkboards were the primary teaching tools. Lessons were interminable lectures with minimal classroom interaction, quizzes, or problem-solving. Often, we had no slides or even course books, just suggested reading lists. This meant we had to take extensive notes, hindering our understanding of the lesson – a massive waste of time in my opinion.

However, I did learn some tricks that turned out to be useful for my success as a student and my career:

- 1. Always ask why: to fully understand any subject, it's key to understand the reasons behind concepts. For example, finding where a function is increasing. You search for 'x' values with a positive derivative. Why? Because the derivative is related to the slope. By grasping 'why', concepts are easier to remember and reconstruct if forgotten.
- 2. Use many resources: sometimes we might not fully understand a concept the way it was taught to us. Luckily enough, the variety of resources we can access is unlimited: first, the university's library, then all the online material we might possibly need.
- 3. Never miss an opportunity: to be successful in the future workplace, you must be versatile beyond your major. With universities like ADU offering myriad growth opportunities, it's wise to engage in as many extracurricular activities, workshops, and competitions as you can. Today's seeds will bear tomorrow's fruits.

The role of the ASC

Something that would have made a difference for me as a student was a system of support like the one you have in the Academic Success Center here in ADU.

The Academic Success Center (ASC) at ADU is a facility that I would have loved to have as an undergrad: it serves as an invaluable hub for those in need of academic assistance by offering free mentoring and peer tutoring, but it also fosters connections among students.

If used properly, the ASC can also be much more than that, and transcend its role as a support center, evolving into a collaborative platform. Imagine students from similar courses meeting in the ASC, studying together independently or under a peer tutor's guidance before critical exams or projects. This collaborative approach, proven to be more effective than solo study, is the essence of what ASC provides, fostering a community-focused learning environment.



Some advice on how to make the ASC visits fruitful for tutees:

1. Come Prepared:

Tutees should come prepared with specific questions & topics they want to discuss. This assists to maximize the session time and ensures they get better understanding of the topics.





2. Tutees should be open and honest

Tutees should be open & honest about their strengths and weaknesses of the content. This provides tutors an opportunity to customize our approach as per the individual needs.

3. Take Notes

Tutees must take notes during the session for their own self-study understanding to review later and recall better.





4. Follow Up

Tutees should follow up after the session for further concerns. This ensures that they actually utilized the efforts to prepare.

5. Attend Regularly

Tutees should attend tutoring sessions regularly for building strong foundation of understanding of the course matter, because this assists the tutor too to identify their graph of understanding.



6. Book an Appointment

Make sure to book an appointment. Then email your tutor to inform her about the course and the chapters which you want to study, so the tutor can prepare for it.

Bill Gates has a long list, here are some that I curated from his list:

The Lincoln Highway, by **Amor Towles**. "I put Towles's *A Gentleman in Moscow* on my summer books list back in 2019, but I liked this follow-up novel even more. Set in 1954, it's about two brothers who are trying to drive from Nebraska to California to find their mother; their trip is thrown way off-course by a volatile teenager from the older brother's past. Towles takes inspiration from famous hero's journeys and seems to be saying that our personal journeys are never as linear or predictable as we might hope."

The Ministry for the Future, by Kim Stanley Robinson. "When I was promoting my book on climate change last year, a number of people told me I should read this novel, because it dramatized many of the issues I had written about. I'm glad I picked it up, because it's terrific. It's so complex that it's hard to summarize, but Robinson presents a stimulating and engaging story, spanning decades and continents, packed with fascinating ideas and people."

The Road to Character, by **David Brooks**. "The insightful *New York Times* columnist examines the contrasting values that motivate all of us. He argues that American society does a good job of cultivating the "résumé virtues" (the traits that lead to external success) but not our "eulogy virtues" (the traits that lead to internal peace of mind). Brooks profiles various historical figures who were paragons of character. I thought his portrait of World War II General George Marshall was especially enlightening. Even if the distinction between the two types of virtues is not always crystal clear, *The Road to Character* gave me a lot to think about. It is a thought-provoking look at what it means to live life well." Source: https://www.gatesnotes.com/Holiday-Books-2015

Range, by **David Epstein** "Epstein provides a good framework for understanding why polymaths are so important for innovation. "In kind environments, where the goal is to re-create prior performance with as little deviation as possible, teams of specialists work superbly." That's why if I had to get surgery, I'd seek out a subspecialist who had a lot of experience with whatever procedure I needed. But when it's a "wicked environment," your job is not to repeat a complex procedure. By definition, it's to do something that no one has done before. Epstein reports that when researchers study great innovators, they find "systems thinkers" with an "ability to connect disparate pieces of information from many different sources" and who "read more (and more broadly) than other technologists."
