However, there are many debates about which one is the oldest continuously operating university.

Over the past millennium, the number of universities worldwide has grown exponentially. Today, there are over 33,000 universities and colleges globally, with the largest concentrations found in the US, China, and India. This expansion has been driven by the increasing demand for Higher Education, as well as the recognition of the vital role universities play in advancing scientific research and economic development, and shaping the leaders of tomorrow.

In an era of rapid technological change and global interconnectedness, the role of universities has become more crucial than ever driving advancements in fields ranging from medicine to renewable energy. They also play a vital role in shaping the next generation of leaders, thinkers, and problem-solvers, equipping students with the knowledge and critical thinking skills needed to tackle the complex challenges of the modern world.
